Accessibility – Help! Can't see, can't hear, can't touch

Facebook is changing.

One recent change, in particular, caused me grief. This situation may arise for only those who signed onto Facebook a long time ago... probably decades ago. At that time, Facebook's registration form assigned new users an ID that was actually an email address (xxxxxx@facebook.com). That email address, along with a self created password, became your username. Within the last two months, Facebook has changed the username to omit the part of the username that was the "@facebook.com" suffix. Only the original prefix text (the xxxxx before the @ sign) is now the username. No users were informed of this change, even though Facebook had long ago shut down their facebook.com mail server to outsiders.

How did I learn about this? Well, I installed the Firebox browser extension, called "Facebook Container" on a regularly used desktop. Facebook immediately asked for my login credentials again, which it just as suddenly refused. Even after uninstalling the Facebook Container extension, the same error messages continued, refusing readmission to Facebook. This was particularly confusing, since I had used the full Facebook email address and password successfully, as recently as two months ago, to login on a new smart phone. Restarting the browser, restarting the computer, using a different browser... nothing worked. The solution came by chance. Fortunately, all other devices, on which I had recently accessed Facebook, still worked (maybe they used a session token, still valid).

Therefore, while in Facebook, on another computer, I was able to discover my current username, in my **personal Profile**. It was simply the old ID, or **the prefix to my defunct Facebook email address**. *What a time waster!!* Those who decide to explore the Facebook user interface more deeply, will notice many other unannounced changes. One announced change is the removal of fact checking, to be replaced by individual users, filling out notes, challenging the veracity of a particular post.

Grok is a Musk AI Chatbot

X worked quickly to build a **Large Language Model**, consisting of thousands of GPUs, so as not to be left behind in this new field of AI. Science Fiction readers will note that "**grok**" is a term introduced in Robert A. Heinlein's 1961 book, "Stranger in a Strange Land", to mean "**understanding**" "**instinctive knowing**", or even "**agreement**". It is a somewhat nebulous term, similar to "**woke**" (in modern usage) with its conflicting meanings.

The **Grok app** may now be available on some Apple phones and tablets. It can answer queries, carry on a conversation, make summaries, and create a limited number of AI generated images. A beta web version is at...**Grok**

Show for Kids Moving to Netflix

Not everyone on cable, or antennae, can watch good kids' shows. But, anyone, with Internet and a screen, can get suitable shows online, through streaming.

Public broadcasters, like the CBC, are in the forefront when it comes to streamed content. So is YouTube, which also allows contributors to own their own content (music in particular) and make some money. One YouTuber, whose show is directed to young children, has 13 million subscribers (paid and unpaid). **Ms. Rachel** is so successful, that Netflix has enticed her to its paid subscription only streaming service.

DeepSeek Chinese AI

American dominance in AI now faces a Chinese challenger... one that required less computing power and energy to create. Results compare well to Open AI's **ChatGPT**. The source for training data, for this **LLM**, was not disclosed, although the source code is open, including the method used to speed up data processing. That's why North American stock markets took a deep dive on the day **DeepSeek** went live. Of course it is still a China-based service; hence, able to record all online actions of its users. [That's a security risk some countries are unwilling to take.]

As I understand it, the DeepSeek's methodology is akin to chemical distillation, or perhaps it is like early childhood brain development, in the sense that a smaller AI model prepares output for a more sophisticated model. Programmers liken it to the distillation process, where fractioning of a base chemical produces other chemicals that are reconstituted to make more complex molecules.

[Or, perhaps, it is like a brain, developing a larger vocabulary as one section of brain communicates results to a different section of the brain. This is just personal speculation, here.]

Heavy users of basic ChatGPT pay \$20/mnth, for basic, while pro users pay \$200/mnth. The battle between ChatGPT and Google Gemini is causing both companies to bleed money.

The **Nothing Phone (2a) Plus** will also offer a pre-installed ChatGPT.

SNOWSKY Retro Nano – Bluetooth DAC, Headphone Amplifier

Despite looking like a cassette tape player, the **Retro Nano** simply improves audio quality while listening on headphones or earbuds. It is also battery operated, with dual physical audio jack ports, and built-in Bluetooth DAC (Digital Analogue Conversion).



SNOWSKY is a sub-brand of **FiiO**.

Battery recharging can to be done with a separate device. However, when using USB-C, battery power is not needed. One side of the Retro Nano has play, pause, advance, and volume buttons. "**Retro**" refers to the 8 sound presets, able to mimic older recordings. Adding the app to your phone will integrate with the audio output from the phone.

[The Retro Nano is so new that Amazon.ca does not provide a price, nor does the FiiO website. However, the website warns about (and lists) unauthorized sellers of their products.]

Windows January Updates May Kill DACs

Audiophiles who enjoy the extra quality of sound from **Digital Audio Converters** may be out of luck... not permanently though. Microsoft is working to fix this bug in the latest Win11/10/Server update, causing DACs to stop working, especially those plugged into a USB1.0 port. This bug does not effect the existing computer's main audio output port, just those on external USB devices.

PowerToys updated to version 0.88.0 with ZoomIt

Highlights:-

- "New utility: **ZoomIt** a screen zoom, annotation, and recording tool for technical presentations and demos. This utility from **Sysinternals** has had its source code released and included in PowerToys. ZoomIt will still continue to be updated and shipped by **Sysinternals** for users who prefer to have it as a standalone utility outside of PowerToys. Thanks @markrussinovich, @foxmsft and @johnstep for contributing the original code and reviewing the PowerToys integration!
- Video Conference Mute has been deprecated and was removed from PowerToys.
- Net 9.0.1 fixed many issue in WPF, improving stability for PowerToys Run."

Those who have been using the Sysinternals version of ZoomIt, with the one-click mute feature, will need to install it as a standalone, to regain this function.

Waterloo to the Rescue

Apparently the Linux kernel has doubled in size over the last decade, causing some to believe Linux should trim it down, by deprecating support for a lot of rare or old hardware.

However, despite its size, the installation process only installs support code for hardware it recognizes; on that machine, thereby keeping the installed size within reason.

<u>Waterloo "brainers"</u> did not reduce the size of the Linux kernel. Instead, they enlarged it by 30 lines of code. This tiny addition to version 6.13 makes it possible to run servers more efficiently, and at a significant energy saving. Large operations, already hungry for more and more electricity, can trim their demand by up to 30%. **Large Language Model (LLM)** training and **Bitcoin** problem solving are eating up increasing amounts of power, to the detriment of world climate. Defending Against AI

Not everyone is happy about AI! Of course, the big players (OpenAI. Google, Facebook, X, DeepSeek) and government spy agencies, love it. The acquisition of training data carries a huge dollar price, not just for the web crawlers collecting it, but the to each of the large databases supplying up-to-date information to requests. Repositories are another unsuspecting payee for data acquisition. Newspapers and archives, must pay for the increased bandwidth cause by web crawlers. They try to resist by placing a **robots.txt** file instruction on websites, specifically instructing "**Do not crawl**!"

These LLM web crawlers simply ignore such requests. They continue to digest content, and reformat/plagiarize it as 'intelligent' responses, never paying for the use of this information.

Programmers, who do not like the way the web is going, in terms of legality, political policies, and social damage, have created a partial technical solution, in the form of a digital poison, called a "tar pit".

Once a crawler is trapped in the tar pit, it can't get out. It's stuck in a loop, gobbling up digital babble... wasting time and money.

Avoid Google Search AI results in Chrome

The default Google search engine is the AI version, which yields a conversational set of top comments, created by AI. However, some of these comments may be wrong.


To go back to the old web based results, requires tweaking.

In the **Chrome browser**, this is achieve by creating a new site search, based on additional Google search parameters.


Finding the appropriate entry fields (that is, finding the deeply nested editing location) is non-trivial.

1. While in **Chrome**, you may get to the *Add Site Search* field by typing the following in Chrome's top field. *chrome://settings/searchEngines*


Or, try clicking on the three vertical dots in the top right, to then click on Settings. [I did not find a way to add special google search parameters in Edge or Firefox. This works only for Chrome.] Then choose *Search engine*, and "*Manage search engines and site search*".



2. Followed by scrolling down to -Add a Site search.




3. After clicking on the **Add** button enter the following texts in the appropriate fields. (*google.com* is for all countries; *google.ca* should lead to only Canadian results, but will be refused in this setting.)




Use curly brackets... {google:baseURL}/search?udm=14&q=%s [Leave out any http://if it appears] And, Save.

4. Once added, make it the default search engine by clicking on the 3 vertical dots and selecting "Make default".



5. When opening a new tab, the screen should contain a Google Search Field, but searching from the browser bar should also work.



[This new **Google (Web)** search may work, for some, only if **Chrome** is the default browser. But should work anytime Chrome is used as the browser.]

[If so, Edge may protest a little at being changed from the default.]

[Users of **Firefox** will note that Google is already the default search engine in that browser. Firefox is paid, by Google, to make it so.]

Kodak Smile+ 2 in 1

Kodak is back, with a new camera that can print photos on larger sticky-backed sheets. (3.5x4.25 inches) They will not smudge.

Use a phone app to edit before printing (optional) and/or share to social media (supports augmented reality).

Connectivity is by Bluetooth. The rechargeable battery should last for 35 prints per charge. Add an SD card for storage; or, sync with the phone for storage.

ZINK is the printing technology used, at a cost of about \$1USD per print (\$60CAD for 40 sheets). The camera itself costs \$150USD\\$200CAD.

Linux - Nitrux OS



After reading about Nitrux OS, which was mentioned in the Linux in the News section, I though I would try it in Virtualbox to see how it performed.

First however – here are some of the features of Nitrux OS.

I seldom boot into Windows so it is difficult to compare it to Windows 10 or 11.

Nitrux offers a KDE environment with it's own customized desktop look and feel.

Nitrux offers a very attractive desktop look and feel. The system is Immutable! What is Immutable about?


Immutable Linux distributions come with a read-only core system. This means the base operating system, once installed, cannot be modified during regular use.

Because since the core system is read-only, it's far less vulnerable to malware and tampering. If you can't add anything to the operating system, you can't corrupt it. In addition, immutable distributions use containerization for applications.

This further isolates programs from the core system and each other. So, even if you do have a bad application, it has far less access to the underlying system than, say, a Windows application does to Windows.

Most of the applications offered by Nitux come from app images. App images are self contained programs that run without the need of any system supporting files.


Here is the starting Desktop without any changes.



Here is the desktop when I click on the Start menu button.



Now I click on the Utilities folder in the illustration above. Here is the result.



Nitux also offers the program called Bottles as shown in the image above. A bottle is a container for a program or a game or even an OS [like Windows]. Bottles is similar to Virtualbox or Vmware but is able to run programs without an operating system. The programs are safe to run and will not affect the OS.

Nitrux by design is secure and fast. I will demonstrate Nitrux at the next Linux meeting if any of you want to see it.
